Program Design

5 Reasons for Program Design

- You want to make sure....
 - There is really a need for the program
 - The design you are considering actually meets the needs of the intended participants
 - The program you are considering has been shown to be effective
 - The program has been appropriately adapted to fit your context
 - The program is actually working for the participants

Consider the Context

- The is the design intended for the geography? (urban, rural, remote)
- Is the design intended for a certain population and have you taken their unique needs into consideration?
- Is the design part of a larger delivery system? Does a system exist to support the program?
- How will the program be perceived by potential participants?
- Does it appropriately consider aspects of diversity?

Involving Key Stakeholders

- Involve many stakeholders with differing points of view
- Stakeholders can include:
 - Staff
 - Participants
 - Funders
 - Influential people in the community
 - Target Population
 - Other agencies
- This involvement can help determine what is important and create balance in values, principles and practicalities

Program Design Inclusions

- Need for program
 - Assesses population needs, what is currently available and what gaps may exist
 - e.x. Mental Health Assessment
- Program objectives and outcomes
 - What will the program accomplish for participants?
- Program principles
 - Fundamental norms, rules and values that guide the program (e.x. Being inclusive, client focused, faith focused...)
- Program components
 - Specific set of inter-connected activities provided (e.x. a housing program might include an assessment of housing need, individual case management, landlord education, etc)
- Budget/Cost
 - What will it cost to implement the program

Program Design Inclusions

- Funding Strategy
 - How will the program be funded? Can it be done with the current budget?
- Governance
 - Existing organization governance, collaborative between several organizations. Needs to include process for decision making.

Steps of Program Design

Steps for Program Design

- Identify a potential need
- Conduct a needs assessment
- Research potential programs for filling need
- Select an evidence-based design
 - This means a design that has been previously implemented and evaluated and has demonstrated some ability to produce a desired outcome for the target group.
 - If such program does not exist, components of a program may be selected and adapted, or a new program may be designed. If a new program is innovative, it should be noted with reasons for trying something new.

Steps for Program Design

- Develop the program design (using a Logic Model!)
 - Pilot the program
 - Roll out the program
 - Monitor and evaluate
 - Consult with stakeholders

- Other Considerations for success
 - Involve stakeholders at all stages
 - Adapt program models to meet your population's needs
 - Build monitoring and evaluation into your program

Tools for Program Design

Theory of Change and Logic Models

What is Theory of Change?

- An illustration of how and why a desired change is expected to happen.
- A map of what happens between the program you want to implement and the change it needs to cause

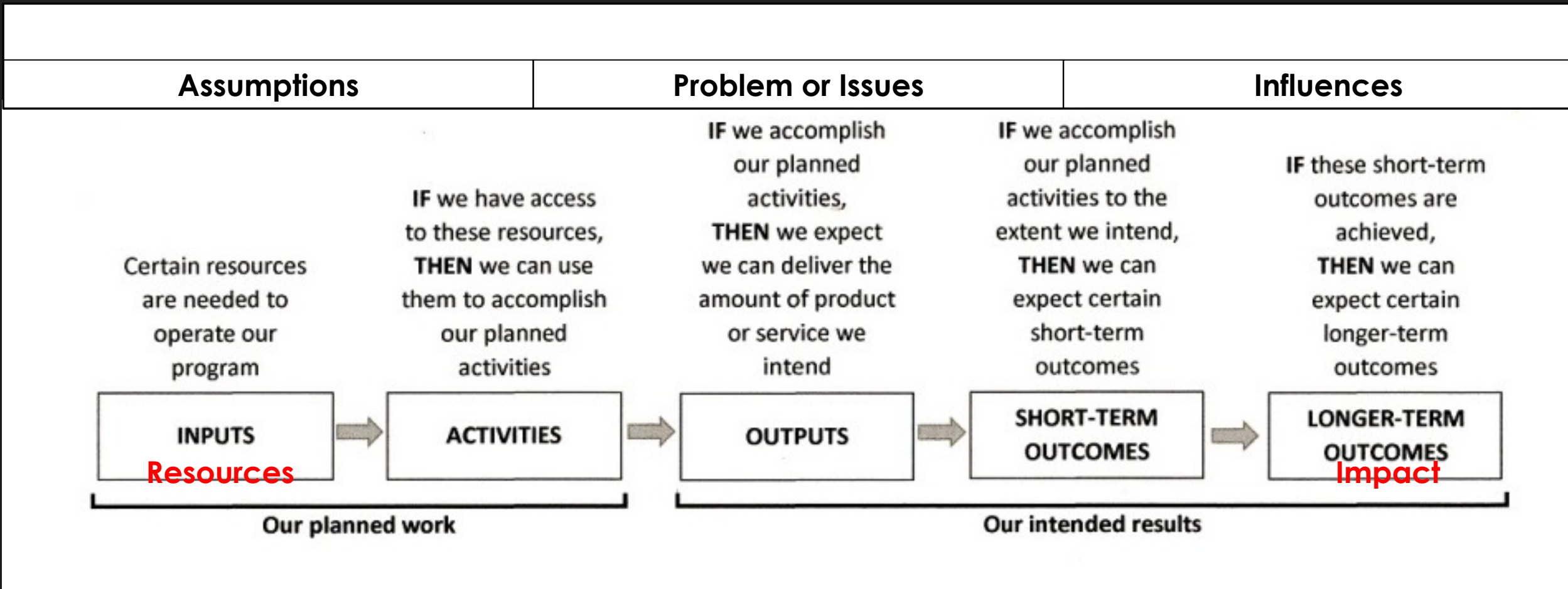
What is a Logic Model?

- A tool used to implement a theory of change
- A logic model is a picture/roadmap of how your program is supposed to work
- It explains that your strategy is a good solution to the problem you are addressing
- Explains visually what activities will bring about change and the results you expect to see
- Keeps all partners moving in the same direction, providing a common language and a common point of reference

When Can a Logic Model Be Used?

- During planning
- During implementation of program
- During staff and stakeholder orientation
- During program evaluation
- During advocacy

Logic Model Diagram

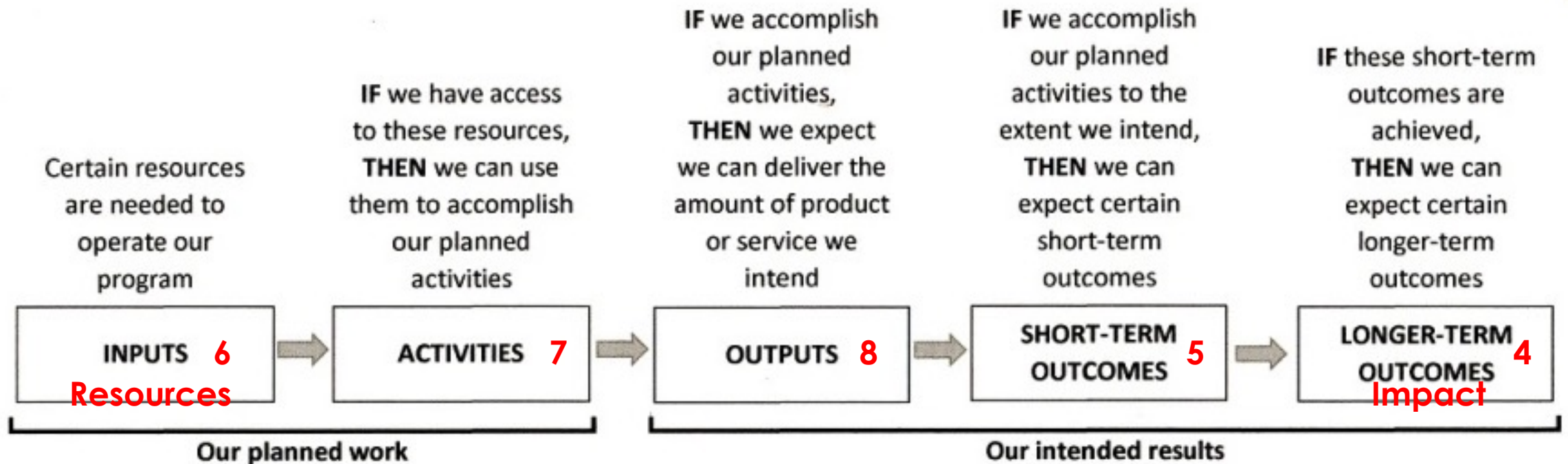


Logic Model Diagram

Components of a Logic Model

○ “If – Then Logic”

○ Problem or Issues

- What is the problem(s) you are trying to address with this program (or as an organization if you are using it for organizational strategic planning)

○ Assumptions

- Hypothesis - We assume that if we implement this program, it will impact the problem in this way

○ Influences

- Positive or negative influences that could enhance or derail your program. These could be regional culture, geography, policy, etc.

Components of a Logic Model

- Impact
 - In 7-10 years, what is your overarching pie in the sky goal with this program
- Long Term Outcomes
 - In 1-3 years and 3-5 years (depending on length of grant), what do you hope to accomplish with this program
- Resources
 - What resources do you need in order to effectively implement this program? Funding, partnerships, staff, volunteers?
- Activities
 - Once you have resources, what activities/things do you need to do to get the program up and going and implemented
 - Once you are up and going, what activities/things do you need to do to maintain the program, collect data, know if the program is effective, etc.
- Outputs
 - This is confirmation of activity completion. You are putting completion goals/numbers to your activities.

Ag Magnet School Logic Model

Resources

Ag Magnet School established in partnership with SPS and MSU

Activities

1. Build School
2. Develop 5th grade immersive curriculum based in agri-science and agri-business
3. District Wide Initiatives
 - Student-Led Advocacy regarding Farm to School programming and policy
 - Implement a student-Led Farmer's Market
 - Re-establish FFA
 - Create and implement a 4th grade Experience SPS immersive field trip experience aligning with the Ag School
 - Create and implement an EXPLORE summer school experience-based learning at the Ag School.
 - Create and implement GOCAPS experiences at the Ag School.

Objectives

1. Fall 2020—school opens serving 40 students in Year 1, 80 in Year 2, and 120 by Year 3.
2. Annually, students will have proficient understanding of farming practice and how to implement practice at home.
3. Annually, students will have proficient understanding of college/career pathways into Ag related fields.
4. Annually, increase lottery applications for the Ag School
5. Annually, increase the number of SPS students enrolling in Ag-based electives in Jr. High and HS.
6. By 2023, a district wide Farm-to-School policy is implemented
7. By 2022, an SPS farmer's market is established
8. In 2021, an Experience SPS 4th grade farm field trip is implemented
9. By 2021, EXPLORE has a farm-based summer school experience on the Ag School campus
10. By 2023, opportunities for GOCAPS experiences are implemented on the Ag School Campus

Impact

1. Decrease food insecurity among SPS students
2. Increase post-secondary educational attainment in agri-business/science among SPS students
3. Increase enrollment of SPS students at the MSU Darr College of Agriculture
